

2015 Summary Report of Accomplishments

Commercial Livestock and Small Farm Operations

- 172 commercial and small farm landowners assisted
- 22 farm plans completed
- 21 structural BMPs implemented
- 9 farm/dairy plans updated





Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP)

- 10 new contracts signed for 2016 spring planting totaling 78.66 acres
- 3 new projects planted
- 603 buffer acres installed to date
- 192,936 feet (36.5 miles) of riparian restoration implemented to date
- 274,537 native trees planted to date
- 11 landowners signed re-enrollment contracts
- New promotional brochures designed and mailed to landowners

Firewise and Fire Adapted Communities

- 4 Firewise plans written
- 4 Firewise presentations and outreach events conducted
 ~80 attendees
- 11 recognized Firewise Communities/USA in Skagit County to date
- 5 fire weather monitoring stations installed across the county and data collected
- 2 hazardous fuels reduction projects implemented
- WA State ranks 3rd in the nation for number of Firewise Communities/USA 118

Forest Stewardship Program and EQIP

- 20 forest conservation plans written encompassing 1237 total acres

Professional Engineering

- Established Manure Share Program

- Co-sponsored 4th Annual Alger Seed Sale/Swap & Arbor Day Celebration – 200 attendees/21 vendors (distributed 100 native plants)
- Co-sponsored Sustainable Samish Garden Tour 75 attendees
- Co-sponsored Kids in Nature: Families Outdoors at Pomona Grange Park 62 participants
- Networked and held monthly meetings with Samish neighborhood groups
- Ongoing technical support to the Friday Creek Habitat Stewards
- Organized 3 work parties for Naturescape Demonstration Garden on Silver Creek
- Lead 4 tours of Naturescape Demonstration Garden & Alger NRSP projects 306 participants
- Hosted educational display/kids activities at Bow Little Market
- Established Friday Creek Storm Team monitoring run
- Recruited 2 Friday Creek residents to participate in CoCoRaHS Rain Gauge program (for Storm Team monitoring program)
- Hosted educational display and hands-on watershed-based activities at 5 Samish watershed events

Environmental Education

- 775 students (31 classes) participated in the annual Sixth Grade Conservation Tour in May
- Participated in the Skagit Watershed Letterbox Trail
- Hosted educational displays and "hands-on" educational activities for the Festival of Family Farms at Taylor Shellfish Farms (2,100 attendees) and Ovenells Ranch (800 attendees); Taylor Shellfish-tival (200 attendees); Skagit River Salmon Festival (6,000 attendees)
- 500 tree seedlings distributed to students in honor of Arbor Day
- 2 community proclamations in recognition of Arbor Day and "Soil and Water Stewardship Week" at Skagit County Commissioners' meetings in April
- Promoted Arbor Day on KAPS and KBRC radio stations, including tree trivia
- 44 posters received for the Soil and Water Stewardship poster contest for local youth grades K-12



Marine Biotoxin Monitoring Program

- 25 community volunteers participated in the 2015 sampling season
- 8 local recreational shellfish harvesting beaches monitored twice monthly April thru Sept.

Backyard Conservation Stewardship Program

- 48 individuals completed the Spring 2015 Backyard Conservation Stewardship Short Course
- 1,000+ Skagit County residents, farms, parks, and schools have applied sustainable landscaping practices and have certified their yards as backyard wildlife habitats/sanctuaries



Low Impact Development (LID) & Stormwater Education



- Over 600 storm markers installed by volunteers on storm drains
- 48 stormwater education presentations provided to 1,155 Skagit County students
- Hosted booths at 2 school science fairs providing watershed model presentations and educational materials distributed ~400 attendees
- Hosted Sustainable Landscape Training for Professional Landscapers 50 attendees
- Provided LID/Raingarden presentations at 8 events reaching 448 residents
- Hosted Detention Pond Maintenance Training 23 attendees
- Hosted 4 sustainable landscaping garden tours, including tour of native plant demonstration garden, naturescape garden, and County rain garden/LID project - 162 participants
- Ran stormwater education ad at Burlington and Anacortes cinemas May thru July 2015 reaching over 165,000 people
- Designed stormwater education flier and media ad
- Hosted "Puget Sound Starts Here" educational display and watershed model/and or stormwater game at 6 community events (8,610 attendees overall)
- Participated in "Skagit EcoNet"

Skagit Stream Team

- 77 volunteers participated in the 2014/15 Stream Team Program and monitored for fecal coliform, temperature, dissolved oxygen, and turbidity twice a month at stations located in the Padilla Bay, Samish Bay, Fisher Creek, Kulshan Creek, Trumpeter Basin, Gages Slough, Clyde Creek, and Nookachamps Creek basins
- 9 volunteers participated in Storm Team program
- Storm Team volunteers initiated new storm event study of Friday Creek watershed
- Over 1,250 Stream Team volunteer hours reported for 2014/2015 monitoring season
- Annual Stream Team report completed and distributed
- Hosted "How Clean is Your Neighborhood Stream?" event 26 attendees
- Hosted annual Stream Team celebration 77 volunteers recognized
- Coordinated volunteer stream cleanup project on Martha Washington Creek 8 volunteers



Watershed Masters Volunteer Training Program



- 19 individuals completed the fall 2015 Watershed Masters Training Program
 510 participants to date
- ~3,700 Watershed Master volunteer hours reported in 2015 over 46,700 total hours to date
